3 EASY STEPS

TO PROPERLY STORE AND GET RID OF MEDICATIONS



LOCK

Store your medications in a lock box or locked medicine cabinet.



DROP

Drop off unused medication at a kiosk at your local pharmacy or police station. See the map on the other side for a location near you.



MAIL

Mail unused medication in a pre-paid envelope. Request a Rx mail-back bag at healthvermont.gov.
